excerpt from general phonetics for missionaries and students of languages this book has been prepared with the object of helping language students to enter their field of work with some means of coping with the difficulties they are likely to meet as regards foreign pronunciation i have described more or less fully some four score of the main types of human speech sounds and have given some account of the chief phonetic phenomena the work makes no pretence to be anything like exhaustive of the subject but it aims at being suggestive i hope that students who read it and are led to feel interested in phonetics will be incited to undertake a detailed study of the works of those authors who have specialised in some particular language or group of languages i have written mainly for those whose native language is english and therefore the sounds of english are taken as
